### **Singular and Plural Nouns**

Nouns can be singular or plural. When you are talking about one person, animal, place, or thing, use a singular noun.

**These are singular nouns**: an aeroplane; a letter; a bicycle; a map; a boy; a photograph; a bus; a refrigerator; a comb; a slide; a girl; a swing.

an axe; an igloo; an egg; an orange; an envelope; an umbrella; an ice cream; an uncle.

When you are talking about two or more people, animals, places, or things: use plural nouns.

Most nouns are made plural by adding -s at the end.

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Singular — Plural: bird — birds; broom — brooms; camel — camels; desk — desks; doll— dolls; egg — eggs; flower — flowers; fork — forks; game — games; lamb — lambs; nest — nests; pen — pens; photo — photos; shirt — shirts; spoon — spoons.
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Sometimes plural is made by adding -es at the end.

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Singular — Plural; beach — beaches; branch — branches; box —boxes; bush — bushes; church — churches; dish — dishes; dress — dresses; sandwich — sandwiches; witch — witches.

dragonfly (ड्रैगनफ्लाई)


A large insect, usually a bright colour. पारदशा पख बाला पतला कीडा.



dress Something worn by women (इंस) पोशाक; लिबास; परिधान.




dove A bird which is like a pigeon. फाख्ता; (बव) कबृतर के परिवार का सदस्य.
